The Work of FVP

Family Violence Project has worked across the communities of Somerset and Kennebec counties for almost thirty eight years, helping abuse victims plan for their safety and accessing the resources available to them. We provide a twenty-four hour helpline, individual advocacy and group support, emergency shelter, and information about how to obtain a civil order for protection from abuse. We operate two shelters and three offices in Skowhegan, Waterville, and Augusta.

We believe every single person has the right to live a life free of abuse. Every adult and every child deserves to feel safe in their homes and with the people closest to them, who will love and respect them. And we understand that for far too many, those basic human rights have been violated.

This is why we believe we must bring our voices into the schools, into businesses, helping organizations, and into faith communities. Domestic violence can happen in any family, and people who have been affected by abuse are everywhere. Our advocate educators talk with children and youth about respect, about developing healthy relationships and about how to speak up and speak out. We work alongside

employers who want to create workplaces that are responsive when an employee has experienced abuse. We talk with other helping professionals to increase their understanding about how to recognize abuse and connect victims to the most appropriate resources.

Menswork is a Family Violence Project program for men who have been convicted of domestic assault. It is a unique opportunity for men to understand where and how violence is learned and how to make changes in their own beliefs, values and behaviors.

We are working hard in our communities. In our last full year, we assisted almost 1800 people affected by abuse. It is our goal to work ourselves out of a job! We believe that we can end domestic violence, and we know it will take all of us to do that. Everything you do – every single act of kindness, every show of respect, every voice seeking justice – counts.
